When September 11 occurred, I definitely felt a pull to serve in any way that I could. After graduating high school, I decided to go to college but after two years, it wasn't satisfying. So then, I decided to join the US Air Force and was able to get job in Fire Protection (FIRE). I've always felt that I wanted to join the military at some point. My dad was in the Air force for 20+ years, and I grew up with the concept of service before self. Visiting the military bases as a kid was always fun. Getting to see the military aircraft became a sort of treat, as my dad and I roamed the base while running his errands.

One of the highlights of my military career for me has always been the traveling to different parts of the world like England, Scotland, Japan, Okinawa, Ireland, and many of the states in the US. Another highlight was the opportunity that I was given to deploy overseas to the Middle East which was a great experience. I was happy to contribute and do my part. Also, being able to participate in all the training required for my job classification. This gave me a bunch of fire certifications that translated very well into civilian life and helping me secure a career that I currently hold. Training was very hands on, realistic and fun.

The main challenge is just being away from home a lot. Whether I was deployed, off somewhere at a training class or just a normal duty on Oʻahu, it can be tough to miss a lot of things or events that may be happening at the time at home on Maui. After over 13 years now I am still serving in the Air Force Reserve where I plan to one day happily retire.

The first thing I would advise would be to know your "why" for wanting to join the military. I know so many people who joined because they were bored, and ended up having the worst experience. Also, make sure to do your research. Know exactly what branch you want to join, and the job that you want to hold. As everyone says recruiters are famous for rushing you to sign up under any job classification just to get you in the door. Don't do that! Sign the contract that specifies exactly the career field that you want to do. And if it's not available, then just be patient and wait. Trust me, you will be a lot happier in the long run.

The Hikina Rising Podcast

Embracing the past while envisioning our future. A podcast series featuring alumni, staff, students, and faculty at Kamehameha Schools Maui.



The Hikina Rising podcast was created to connect and create a conduit between KSM alumni and haumāna, sharing information and advice. *"To extend our kula's reach to our alumni and get them reconnected to Kamehameha Schools Maui. It would also give our current students a chance to "talk story" with some alumni."* -Rickard.

The podcast was launched by faculty members Lisa Correa, High School Counselor at the time, currently serving as Assistant Principal, Māhele Lalo, grades K-6; Coach O'Brien, History; and kumu Kaholo Rickard, Math. *"Kevin and I sit down and hash out ideas until one hits us in the face"* -Rickard. *"We ran with ideas we were passionate about. Kaholo and I love sports, so it was natural for us to do a couple of sports podcasts. He loves music, so he did the one with the musicians. I have always been interested in military stuff. But in each case, we felt like it was something that was not talked about well enough to our own students."* -O'Brien. For each session, Coach O'Brien handles the content and guest preparation, and Kumu Rickard is responsible for the technical components of recording and editing. It's brilliant recorded alumni conversations that are accessible to all and easily played from many devices.

When asking Coach O'Brien about the military series (Episode 11:KS Maui Alumni in the Military and Episode 13:Alumni in the Armed Forces), he shares: "*I grew up in a military town, my father was in the army right after WWII, and I was always surrounded by honorable military people. I have a former St. Anthony student/football player who was not a college student prospect. I talked to him about joining the military, and he joined the Navy after high school. He has seen the world, learned a trade, several really, and raised a family. I am humbled that he gives me a* lot of credit for his life. The Military option was never discussed enough on campus so this podcast venture allowed me to share more knowledge with our students and their parents. I have been tracking how many KSM alums have joined. My original goal was a trilogy. Episode 13 was about enlistees basically out of high school. Episode 11 was about going to college and doing ROTC and National Guard while being a college student. The third one is going to be with our military academy alums. So three ways to get into the military, three podcasts."

Kumu Rickard's advice, "To haumāna, you'll be out of high school in just a few years and also become an alumni of Kamehameha Schools Maui. Listen to the advice of our KS Maui alumni and begin to sort out your goals and plans for life beyond high school. To alumni, we are proud of who you have become and appreciate the stories, experiences, and advice you provide for our current haumāna at Kamehameha Schools Maui."

Towards the end of my senior year of high school, I knew I wanted to go to the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa (UHM) to study 'ike and 'ōlelo Hawai'i. UHM's 'Ike Hawai'i program had different tracts, so the one I wanted to choose was specific to Native Hawaiian creative expression (art). Although I got mixed views from some of my teachers wanting me to do "more," there was no other choice for me. What could be more fulfilling than studying our 'ike kupuna, right? I didn't really have a plan regarding the future use of my major, but to me, the knowledge that would be gained was more important than worrying about how it would affect my career opportunities.

While I was at UHM, I worked at Ka Papa Loʻi ʻo Kānewai, and my time there helped me realize the valuable history that the loʻi had in our Hawaiian community. I was also able to use my skills as an artist to create artwork and supplemental materials for events and group tours. This campus job aligned with my educational path and provided an environment where I could grow as a young kanaka. The experience and connections I made while working there were priceless.

I initially started my business to earn extra money for college. It was a small Instagram account selling Hawai'i themed vinyl decals, patches, and pins, mostly to students on campus. After graduation, I decided to commit to a slightly larger scale operation, and rebranded my little business as Lilia Poliahu Studio, with the goal of creating more artwork to offer with the original items. Currently, my business offers pins, vinyl printed stickers, vinyl decals, iron-on patches, art prints, and some jewelry. As I learned from one of my professors in college, Hawaiians are very intentional, and I aim to to the same in my work. There's always a specific reason why I choose the subject matter for my artwork and products. Every item that I create, whether I'm making Pua Kenikeni stickers, or a portrait of Lili'u, must have purpose, function and meaning.

I really enjoyed being a student at KSM. There were so many things that I was able to see and do, and my fondest memories were the random conversations with teachers and administrators. The relationship between students and teachers/staff is super important. It shows how much care the faculty and staff have for their students. I clearly remember Po'o Kula DeLima, on her morning/afternoon walks or during lunch, asking me and whoever she saw, how their day was. Mr. Del was always checking on all the hooligans. Things like that are what I remember most. When you get to college, everything is on you. You won't always have that support, so I cherish these memories.

Be grateful for the things you learn in high school. Because of what I learned at KSM, college was a lot less stressful. I might even say it was easy, with enough effort. From the note taking skills I learned from Ms. Laepa'a my freshman year, the spool method for writing essays in Mr. Oliver's class, the perfect essay in Ms. Haina's class, it was all worth it! The kumu at KSM always have their students' well-being and future in mind, and I learned after leaving KSM that not all high school students are fortunate to have caring kumu.

PCI Alumni Directory Project Update

Last month, KS Alumni Relations implemented a KS Alumni Directory Project. Notifications were sent to every alumni via an email, phone call, or a yellow postcard in the mail.

What is a PCI Alumni Directory? PCI is a third-party company contracted by KS to gather data information in order to update the KS Alumni Directory. The last KS Alumni Directory was published over 10 years ago.

As of today, 6,341 alumni have responded. That's 23.41% of the 27,089 alumni that were targeted.

Here are a few key things to keep in mind:

NO purchase is necessary to participate in the update. The proceedings from the purchase do not affect KS.

PCI has provided a "1(800)" number to call to provide your updates, Monday - Friday, 5AM - 7PM (PT).

You may receive a phone call to update your information if PCI has not been able to contact you via email or mail.

All changes and updates must be made by February 18, 2022 to be included in the printed directory.

The refreshed alumni directory will be available for sale until May 31, 2022. Production will begin June 2022.

Apply for Pauahi Keiki Scholarship 2022-2023

Pauahi Keiki Scholars (PKS) is a need-based scholarship. The application process for the 2022-2023 school year is open to eligible preschool-aged students planning to attend a participating PKS preschool in Hawai'i.

Students applying must be:

• A State of Hawai'i Resident — KS defines Hawai'i residency as having lived continuously in the state of Hawai'i for at least 12 months of date of application

- Born in 2017, 2018, or 2019
- Enrolled or plan to enroll at a participating preschool

Application opened on August 15, 2021 and deadline to apply is December 1, 2021.
